Membership Fees

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) is an adult educational and social organization. A Membership includes unlimited on-campus classes, as well as access to the library, gym, pool, fitness classes, and other amenities of Widener's campus. Members are eligible to participate in clubs and committees, and also received discounted rates on trips, events, and excursions throughout their membership.

Term Memberships may be purchased for \$150 for the spring, summer, or fall semesters. Annual Memberships cost \$275, and include membership benefits for the calendar year.

This is not a creative cooking class! We won't be making or eating food, we'll be looking at it in art through the ages. Since people have been making art, as far back as the Stone Age, they have been depicting food. Some areas we will explore: What symbolic provender did ancient Egyptians take with them to the afterlife? What did a famously famous artist eat for lunch every day? Why did the Dutch paint SO many pictures of food on tables? Many people wash down their food with a drink. So we'll also look at a few beverages in art and of course delve into their histories too. The artworks we will discuss are arranged thematically, according to a rubric which participants have to uncover themselves, deepening their engagement. So what do we learn in such a class? Obviously, a lot about food, both foods we eat ourselves, and foods eaten by other cultures. But also about history: How and why and when foodstuffs traverse the globe. Thirdly, foods in art can be symbols, ones that need some elucidation to us in different centuries and places. And lastly, looking at art from many centuries and cultures expands our

In 1830, Congress passed a law entitled "The Indian Removal Act," signed and implemented by President Andrew Jackson. World War II in Europe and the Pacific

Day: Mondays, Sept. 11, 18, 25, Oct. 2, 9

Times: 1:00PM-2:10PM

World War II had its roots in World War I and the Treaty of Versailles. This course will discuss the causes that led Germany, Italy and Japan to seek a path of world conquest. The first five weeks will cover the war in Africa and Europe with the emphasis on U.S. involvement. The home front was vitally important in the success of our armed forces, and that area will be discussed with great emphasis. The war in the Pacific was a different world from Europe and Africa. The nature of the enemy required death rather than surrender. Every attack required an amphibious assault, the most dangerous type of attack. The geography was entirely different, involving thousands of square miles. Only the development of the atomic bomb prevented a costly invasion of the Japanese homeland.
